What does the fund invest in?

The principal investment objective of BMO Nesbitt Burns Bond Fund is to achieve superior investment returns consistent with the preservation of capital and liquidity by investing in a portfolio of relatively low-risk liquid securities consisting primarily of Canadian federal, provincial and municipal government and corporate bonds, as well as asset and mortgage-backed securities issued by Canadian entities. The fund may invest up to 20% of its net asset value in foreign securities.

The charts below provide you with a snapshot of the fund's investments on September 26, 2012. The fund's investments will change.



How has the fund performed?

This section tells you how this class of the fund has performed over the past 3 years. Returns are after expenses have been deducted. These expenses reduce the class' returns.


It's important to note that this doesn't tell you how the class will perform in the future. Also, your actual after-tax return will depend on your personal tax situation.

Average return

As at September 30, 2012, a person who invested \$1,000 in this class of the fund since its inception now has \$1,297. This works out to an annual compound return of 6.9%.

Year-by-year returns

This chart shows how the class has performed in each of the past 3 completed calendar years. The class did not drop in value in the past 3 years.



How risky is it?

When you invest in a fund, the value of your investment can go down as well as up. BMO Nesbitt Burns Inc. has rated this fund's risk as Low.

Who is this fund for?

- The fund may be a suitable investment for investors looking for Canadian fixed income exposure in their portfolios.
- The fund may be a suitable investment for investors looking to receive a relatively stable stream of income. The fund may be a suitable investment for investors who can accept low investment risk (i.e. you are willing to accept some fluctuations in the market value of your investment over the short-term).

Before you invest in any fund, you should consider how it would work with your other investments and your tolerance for risk.

Are there any guarantees?

Like most mutual funds, this fund doesn't have any guarantees. You may not get back the amount of money you invest.

A word about tax

Depending on tax rules and tax rates that apply to you and the fund, you may have to pay tax on your portion of the fund's earnings and gains, whether paid out to you in cash or reinvested in the fund. Also, you may have to pay tax on any gains you realize when you redeem or sell your investment in the fund. However, if you hold your investment in a registered account such as a Registered Retirement Savings Plan or a Tax-Free Savings Account, generally you will not have to pay tax on earnings or gains that are held in a registered account.

How much does it cost?

The following section describes the fees and expenses you could pay to buy, own and sell Class F units of the fund.

The fund has other classes of units. The fees and expenses are different for each class. You should ask about other classes of units that may be suitable for you.

1. Sales charges

You pay no sales charges when you buy Class F units of the fund. Instead of paying a sales charge on each transaction, you pay an annual fee to your investment adviser based on the value of your assets.

2. Fund expenses

You don't pay these expenses directly. They affect you because they reduce the returns of this class of the fund.

As of June 30, 2012, the Class F expenses of the fund were 0.55% of its value. This equals \$6 for every \$1,000 invested.

Annual rate (as a % of the class' value)

Management expense ratio (MER)

This is the total of the management fee and operating expenses for Class F units of the fund.

Trailing commission

No trailing commission is paid to your dealer in respect of this class of the fund.

3. Other fees

Class F units are designed for investors who are participants in programs that do not require payment of sales charges by investors but who are charged an annual fee by their investment adviser.

You may have to pay other fees when you buy, hold, sell or switch units of the fund.

Fee	What you pay
Short-term trading fee	Up to 2% of the amount that you redeem or switch if you buy or switch and then redeem or switch units of the fund within 30 days of purchasing or switching them. This penalty will be paid directly to the fund.
Switch fee	A fixed charge in an amount determined by your investment adviser may apply on switches. The amount of these fees should be discussed with your investment adviser at the time of a purchase or switch and when you establish an account or registered tax plan.

What if I change my mind?

Under securities law in some provinces and territories, you have the right to:

- withdraw from an agreement to buy mutual fund units or shares within two business days after you receive a simplified prospectus, or
- cancel your purchase within 48 hours after you receive confirmation of the purchase.

In some provinces and territories, you also have the right to cancel a purchase, or in some jurisdictions, claim damages, if the simplified prospectus, annual information form or financial statements contain a misrepresentation. You must act within the time limit set by the securities law in your province or territory.
